Raga Elim Says "Thank You All" by Raga S. Elim, Ph.D., Chairman,

District Committee on International Understanding

My heartfelt thanks to all district Kiwanians for your encouragement and support during my four-year tenure as chairman of the Capital District Committee on International Understanding.

With your help, individually and in clubs across the district, we increased our international awareness and outreach. Above all, we raised more than \$18,000 to fuel

the Initiative for Africa. This achievement won a grant of \$19,000 from the Kiwanis International Foundation, and matching funds



raised the total to nearly \$75,000-all to help children at grave risk in Africa.

Our partner, Kickstart International, has used these funds to establish The Kiwanis Project in the "Tipping Point" area of southwest Kenya, where people still live in refugee camps due to violence after the election three years ago.

ant and not drop members who you know will pay a few days late.

July 29, 2011 - Kiwanis International's 96th Annual Convention in Geneva, Switzerland, marked an exciting few days for The Eliminate Project. Attendees from around the world celebrated the launch of The Eliminate Project's fundraising campaign. Throughout the convention,

they also learned how to plan fundraising activities, educate members, organize service projects and share enthusiasm during general sessions, group workshops and a sponsored luncheon.

The Eliminate Project made a big splash right from the beginning. Kiwanians were awed as International President Sylvester Neal, International Foundation President Jack Harten and immediate past presidents of Key Club International and Circle K International dropped the official The Eliminate Project flag during opening ceremony. The Eliminate Project flag will fly every day at Kiwanis International headquarters to demonstrate Kiwanis' commitment to raise US\$110 million and help eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus.

donors and clubs were recognized for their generosity and early support of The Eliminate Project. Individual Lead Gift Donors, Major Gift donors, 100K Clubs, Model Clubs, and Year of Leadership clubs were all recognized for their tremendous support. The Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor was honored as the first Charter 100K Club, and the Kiwanis Club of Cape Coral was also honored as a 100K Club. Kiwanis International Foundation President recognized all 15 Model Clubs. Kiwanis now has more than 270 Charter Zeller donors and 150 Year of Leadership clubs.

Kiwanis International and UNICEF have joined forces to combat maternal and neonatal tetanus (MNT) worldwide. This historic initiative,

called "The Eliminate Project," will protect the lives of babies and mothers all over the globe and aims to help put an end to this cruel, centuries-old disease. The final push to eliminate MNT global effort will require \$110 million and the dedicated work of UNICEF and every member of the Kiwanis family. The more than 100 million women, along with their future newborns, who will be protected through global MNT elimination efforts along with their newborns live in areas scarred by poverty, poor medical infrastructure or humanitarian crises. The Eliminate Project will also help pave the way for the delivery of other lifesaving services, such as clean water, nutrition and other vaccines.

You and your club are an

integral part of The Eliminate Project. Take the time to learn more about the project, tell your community about Kiwanis' mission to eliminate MNT, talk about The Eliminate Project during your district convention, meet the campaign leaders in your district and begin planning and implementing your service and fundraising efforts.

The gathering of Kiwanis members in Geneva served as a fitting reminder that their efforts will bring families together across the globe, helping save and protect millions of mothers and their future babies from MNT in the countries where it remains a public health threat. 

Key Leader is a leadership education weekend for high school

students focusing on the concept of service leadership and five principles: integrity, growth, respect, community and excellence. The weekend is casual and includes hands-on exercises; writing and reflection activities; cooperative, team activities; physical challenges and more. Students arrive between 4-6 p.m. on Friday and depart between 11 a.m.-12 noon on Sunday. All adult chaperones have undergone background checks, and the weekend is run by a professional facilitator who has successfully completed a training course on the curriculum and who brings experience working with young people.
