This month we launched a new form of communication in the Capital District. The Kiwanis Update is an HTML-email based publication that will go out once a month and highlight important issues for all members of our District. The unique aspect of this communication is that it is the first time we are sending e-mail directly to club members. In the past, all e-mail based communication was sent to the club presidents and



secretaries and then they were expected to pass the information on to their membership.

As a result of Kiwanis International now allowing the districts to download the contact information (including email addresses) of their members, we are able to do these monthly update messages directly to all Capital District Kiwanis members who have an email address on file. For Trustees and Lieutenant Governors, have you found a site and contacted the District New club Committee for help in expanding our outreach to a new group of people? All of us need to work on these things.



Leadership Education, 2011-12 District Committees and the 2011 Kiwanis International Convention in Geneva, Switzerland.

In case you are curious about the statistics, there are roughly 6,375 Kiwanis members in our district. Of those, only 4,309 (68%) members have e-mail addresses on file with Kiwanis International. The email was sent on January 27 and as of the writing of this article so far, 975

people (22.6%) have opened the message, 114 people (2.6%) have clicked on at least one link in the email message, 887 (20.6%) of the emails have bounced back meaning those addresses are not valid and only 14 people (0.3%) have requested to be unsubscribed. More people will open the message as the days go by, but we've already reached more people with this message than any single e-mail update sent in the past.

To be sure that you receive future issues of Kiwanis Update, please make sure that your club secretary has your correct email address. This information is reported by the clubs to Kiwanis International. We will update our list of members e-mail addresses once every quarter so that hopefully with each subsequent issue we can reach more and more of our members. Key Leader Registration by Nicole McDermott




Grafton Kiwanian to be honored with Humanitarian Award by Robert Elsass

"The kinds of people I really want to reach out and help are the people who amidst their own need, can still find a way to give back to the world, even if all they have is a cheerful thought," Barnett says. He is the County Attorney for York County and is being cited for, among other endeavors, his work as Co-founder of Homeless Week at Rodef

Sholom Temple in Hampton, and his volunteer dedication to the Boy Scouts of America.

New Club Builders - New Club Charter Gifts

As Kiwanis clubs continue to reflect their members and their communities, new formats of clubs have been encouraged by the organization. These formats include Internet clubs, 3-2-1 clubs, young professional clubs and others. While these clubs have evolved in recent years, the practice of providing new club charter gifts has not adapted to reflect these new club formats. As an example, an internet club

does not have a purpose for a gong, gavel, banner, or flag as their meetings do not take place in a physical room where these items may be displayed. Unfortunately, these items go unused. To meet these changing needs, Kiwanis International is now offering a "Kiwanis Kash" certificate to all new clubs that can be redeemed in a one-time purchase of either the traditional new club charter gifts (including the gong,

gavel, banner, and flag) or a total retail value of US\$350 of merchandise. All new clubs will still receive member pins, membership certificates, and other items not considered "gifts" and would be eligible to redeem offers for one free International Convention registration and a free BUG or Terrific Kids kit in addition to redeeming the Kiwanis Kash certificate. This new process begins January 1, 2011.

Suburban Frederick Club Supports Local Child Lab School with Literacy Rug by Peter Brehm

The Kiwanis Club of Suburban Frederick recently presented to Onica Prall Lab School Director Susan Weddle, Head Teacher Debbie Smith, and the three-year old class at the Onica Prall Lab School a Literacy Rug purchased by the Kiwanis as a donation to the school. The Literacy Rug is a triangular carpet that encompasses bright red, yellow, green, and blue colors plus a variety of shapes that is used in lessons to enhance student learning. Assisted by the class and Smith, club Vice President Eric Gatrell and



member Peter Brehm unrolled the rug, which was put to immediate use. The Onica Prall Child Development Laboratory School is operated by the Department of Education of Hood College. The school provides preschool education for children who are three and four years old.
